**INGREDIENTS** 

2 cups (10 oz/315 g) all-purpose flour 2 tablespoons sugar

2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder 1 teaspoons baking soda

3/4 teaspoon salt 3/4 teaspoon ground ginge

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/4 teaspoon allspice 2 eggs, beaten

1 1/2 cups (12 fl oz/355 ml) buttermilk

1/2 cup (4 fl oz/118 ml) milk

1/4 cup (2 oz/56 g) unsalted butter, melted

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/2 cup (2 oz/60 g) pecans, toasted and chopped Softened butter, for serving

In a medium mixing bowl, whisk together flour, sugar, baking powder, baking soda, salt, ginger, cinnamon and allspice. In a small bowl, whisk together eggs, buttermilk, milk, butter and vanilla. Stir into dry ingredients until thoroughly combined. Fold in pecans. Cook about 1/4 cup (2 fl oz/59 ml) of batter in a lightly greased non-stick skillet. Cook until bubbles form and the edges look done. Flip and cook until browned. Serve

**Raisin Pear Compote** 

4 medium red pears

pancakes with butter and warm compote

1/2 cup (2 1/2 oz/76 g) golden raisins
1/3 cup (3 fl oz/80 ml) freshly squeezed orange juice

1/4 teaspoon salt

2 teaspoons chopped fresh rosemary 2 tablespoons light brown sugar, firmly packed

Cut pears, unpeeled, into 1/2-inch (1 1/4 cm) pieces. Combine with raisins, orange juice, lemon juice, salt, rosemary and sugar in a medium saucepan. Cook for 25 minutes over medium-low heat, stirring every 5 minutes. Keep warm until serving

# Shining a Light on Cooperative Solar

So, you are thinking about solar. Like many energy consumers you care about the environment and seek ways to reduce your own carbon footprint. The benefits of solar to help achieve these goals are without question:

- Solar is a fully renewable resource. By harnessing the power of the sun we generate green power that doesn't emit any pollutants into the atmosphere.
- Once installed, solar is sustainable and needs relatively low maintenance.
- It is an investment in the future to offset the rising costs—monetarily and environmentally -of fossil fuels.

However, the costs for individual homeowners to install rooftop solar or a yard-based array are in the thousands of dollars, plus the additional cost of batteries to store excess energy. In addition to costs, other considerations for going solar are:

- Is your roof/yard shaded?
- Does the roof face the proper direction for optimum sunlight?
- Is your roof suitable? How old is it? Is it in good repair?
- Do you want to lease or buy solar panels?
- How much solar power do you want to generate?

If you are interested in the benefits of solar but are concerned about costs, have a shaded roof/ yard, there are restrictive homeowner covenants or you're a renter, OREMC's Cooperative Solar program puts "going solar" within your reach.

OREMC has two 100 kW solar fields (Kingsland and Hilliard offices) and a 1.86 MW solar site on Highway 82 in Glynn County, Georgia. With Cooperative Solar, you get to choose the right amount of solar energy you want to subscribe to from OREMC. Blocks of solar energy are billed monthly at \$20 and produce approximately 120-200 kWh per month. The electricity delivered to your home through the power grid is calculated and the solar energy generated from your share of the total capacity will be credited back to you.

Keep in mind the monthly output from each share varies due to the position of the sun, time of year and number of cloudy days. Therefore, you will receive different amounts of solar energy each month based on the available sunlight.

## You Can Help Stop Power Theft

Door hinges. Jumper cables. Copper pipe. Wire jumpers. "We've seen it all by people who are trying to divert power by bypassing their meter," notes OREMC Member Service Representative Royce Proctor. "Power theft is a crime that can lead to jail time, thousands of dollars in fines or even worse, death."

Meter tampering—whether it is damage of property or actual theft of services—results in hazardous conditions to those living in the home, OREMC employees and the public. When someone steals electricity by bypassing the meter, they not only affect the reliability of the distribution system but also lose the benefit of overload protections in place on the system. This causes a fire hazard due to increased heat, possible short circuits leading to an arc flash and potentially an explosion.

Your help in stopping power theft benefits all OREMC members. If you are aware of power theft at a location or concerned about a suspicious situation, call our confidential Tip Line: 833 OKE TIPS (833-653-8477). You will be prompted to leave a voice mail with any information you may have including a brief description of what you saw, address location and names of any individuals involved if known.
